Course overview:	<p>If pragmatics is the study of human communication in context, cognitive pragmatics can be defined as the study of the psychological processes and states involved in that activity. As a matter of fact, however, its focus is almost exclusively on language understanding, while very little attention has been paid to language production.</p> <p>The course is designed for post graduate students more specifically, PhD students in English Language and Linguistics. The ultimate aim being to advance a unified model of cognitive pragmatics. Basic themes in this area,</p>	

cognitive pragmatics, are covered ranging from the notion of 'relevance', assumptions, relevance theory, implicit and explicit meaning, cognitive effects and mutual adjustment process to associated and inferential meaning, automatic and controlled processes, mindreading, pragmatics and modularity and certain other cognitive issues.
