| Type of Teaching:               | <p>2 hrs. lecture on key theoretical concepts of critical thinking</p> <p>2 hrs. practical workshops in the form of in-class group work, discussion, and debate.</p> <p><b><u>*All the theoretical materials are carried out practically. In this method, the teacher can make use of the following to help the students achieve their aims:</u></b></p> <p>A. MS Word (font, margin, report cover, referencing, word count)</p> <p>B. MS Power Point (poster design, presentation)</p> <p>C. Collecting data (survey, interview skills).</p> <p>D. Any other activities on the side of students like designing poster, report writing, debating and delivering seminars.</p>  |          |        |

| Requirements for credit points: | <p>*For the award of credit points, it is necessary to constantly get engaged in the class group work and discussion and carry out any extracurricular activities assigned to the students so they can pass the module.</p> <p><b><u>*This module is based on the learner-centred approach.</u></b> Written exams are NOT required. Instead, students are assessed based on <i>their activities and skills like the ability to write reports, critical thinking, expression ability, design posters, debate and work in groups, and the class activities using the formative assessment.</i> This type of assessment motivates students further to learn, using <i>Pedagogy of Freedom</i> instead of <i>Pedagogy Banking Model</i> and memorisation.</p> <p>*Students' attendance is required in all classes.</p> |          |        |
