Next, it will present the strategic and intellectual basis of Russian foreign policy. Hence, different stages of foreign policy development and challenges facing the country after 1991 will be explained. Russia has been trying to regain the status and glory of the Soviet Union since Vladimir Putin's presidency in 2000, especially after Putin's second term in office Through energy tools, as well as the use of military force beyond its borders to maintain regional hegemony.</p> <p>On the other hand, Russia's relations with Western and Eastern countries will be analyzed, as well as several important events such as the Georgian and Ukrainian wars and their impact on international politics and the political system.</p>
