Structure and Types

What is a Paragraph?

- A distinct section of a piece of writing, usually dealing with a single theme and indicated by a new line, indentation, or numbering.
- A **paragraph** is a group of words put together to form a group that is usually longer than a sentence. **Paragraphs** are often made up of several sentences. There are usually between three and eight sentences. In organized forms of writing, such as essays, **paragraphs** contain a topic sentence.

What is a Paragraph

A paragraph is a group of closely related sentences (5-10 Sentences) that develop a central idea.



parts of a Paragraph **Top Bun Topic sentence** Lettuce First supporting detail Tomato Second supporting detail Meat and Cheese Third supporting detail **Bottom Bun** Concluding sentence

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Parts of a Paragraph (Structure)

- **Topic Sentence:** The **main single idea**, and usually the **first sentence** which is the most general sentence of the paragraph. The topic sentence should **neither** be too narrow **nor** too broad.
- Statement of Opinion/Intent
- Not a FACT




Parts of a Paragraph (Structure)

- **Supporting Sentences:** The sentences which follow the topic sentence to support what is stated.
- **DEDE:** details, examples, data, and explanation
- Logical Order



Parts of a Paragraph (Structure)

- Concluding Sentence/s: The last sentence of the paragraph.
- Restating, Summarising, Suggestion or Prediction.



Types of Paragraph

- Narrative: Tell a story *or* a sequence of Events
- **Descriptive: Describe** a scene *or* an object
- **<u>Process</u>: Steps** of how something is done
- **Expository: Explain** *and* provide information on facts, instructions, and definitions

Types of Paragraph

- <u>Persuasive</u>: Share Opinions and Convince others to agree or take actions
- <u>Comparison/Contrast:</u> Similarity and Differences
- Problem Solving: Problems and Solution.

Unity, Cohesion and Coherence

Unity: One paragraph is about **ONE IDEA** (**Topic**, Supporting, and Concluding sentence).

Cohesion: All supporting sentences **connect** to each other and to the topic sentence (*connectors*)

Coherence: Clearly and smoothly **arrange ideas** according to the logical order/chronology.
