

WHAT IS A MOTEL?

• A motel, also known as motor hotel or motor lodge, is a hotel designed for motorists, usually having each entered directly from the parking area room for motor vehicles rather than through a central lobby.

WHAT IS A MOTEL?

- One or two floors that open to a parking lot or central courtyard
- Motels tend to be confined to locations close to roads and highways, often outside of cities but along popular tourist routes.
- They are typically designed for short stays.
- Motels can be the cheapest places to stay near popular destinations.

History

• The motel is a combination of hotel and motor – developed by Kemmons Wilson – founder of the Holiday Inn brand in 1950. However, according to some records, the first motel appeared in 1925 (in California, America). This type of accommodation is a small, simple structure, located along the national roads.

TYPES OF MOTEL

1.THE CITY MOTEL:

Built in town or on the edge of town. It generally involves expensive land, a restricted site, and a structure at least three stories high.

2.THE MORTAR ANNEX:

A relatively new development, adjoins an existing hotel in the city. Whether the motel emphasizes its connection as an annex will depend on the reputation of the hotel and its advertising, location, services, utilities, supervision, and maintenance staff.

3. THE HIGHWAY MORTAR HOTEL:

If space permits, not more than 15 per cent of the site area is used for buildings and parking. This type of motel is usually one or two stories high, with a site of at least three acres.

4. THE RESORT MOTEL:

The resort motel is intended primarily for guests who have reached their destination and usually requires ample facilities for recreation.

5.THE AIRPORT INN:

The airport inn is built at a major, usually intercontinental, airport. A relatively large and high-class operation, this type of motel often has 150 to 300 rooms, two-story guest-room buildings, and a site of at least 90 acres.

Difference between Hotel & Motel

- Motels differ from hotels in their location along highways, as opposed to the urban cores favored by hotels, and their orientation to the outside (in contrast to hotels, whose doors typically face an interior hallway).
- Motels almost by definition include a parking lot, while older hotels were not usually built with automobile parking in mind.

Definition	An establishment that provides paid lodging on a short-term basis only and provides numerous amenities to guests which may increase their lodging satisfaction.	An establishment that provides short-term and long-term lodging usually located with good access to the national road network but with less guest comforts.
Appearance	Single, Multi-storied, or Varies; has rooms that open to interior of the building.	Single, or double storied building with connected rooms, has open walkways, exterior entrances.
Cost	Usually More expensive than Motels- however prices range with star-ratings, room types, amenities, location, nicer accommodations/rooms, etc.	Often Less expensive than Hotels due to lack of amenities, basic rooms, locations, etc
Location	Situated anywhere within a city or village. Often near business districts, airports, downtown areas, attractions, freeways, vacation areas, within/near casinos, sports arenas, and other places.	Usually situated on highways, but can also be found near outskirts of towns, many places where you would find hotels, rural areas, and other places.
Stars	Found with star rating for quality 1-5 stars.	No star rating is considered, but most are rated as 1.5-2.5 stars on travel sites.
Amenities	More amenities- like 1 or more pools (indoor and/or outdoor), jacuzzi, fitness center, arcade/game room, banquet/meeting facilities, business center, WI-fl, different room levels (standard, premium, family suites, jacuzzi suites, etc), among others.	Minimal amenities- usually no pools (outdoor if there is one), jacuzzi, business or fitness centers, or any other amenities listed under hotels.
Brand Examples	Holiday Inn, Best Western, Marriot, Comfort Inn, Sheraton, Four Seasons, Hyatt, Radisson, and many more. Some may be franchises with motel-like layouts, but still have hotel features.	Econo Lodge, Knights Inn, Motel 6, Super 8, and several other chains are usually motels.
